#### Data Resource Profile: The Survey of Health, Ageing and Retirement in Europe (SHARE)

SHARE is a unique panel database of micro data on health, socio-economic status and family life for households in 10 countries of the European Union and Israel. To date, SHARE has collected three panel waves (2004, 2006, 2010) of current living circumstances and retrospective life histories (2008, SHARELIFE); 6 additional waves are planned until 2024. The more than 150 000 interviews give a unique picture of life after the age of 50 years, including health and mental health, economic and non-economic activities, income and wealth, transfers of time and money within and outside the family as well as life satisfaction and well-being. The data are available to the scientific community free of charge at [www.share-project.org](http://www.share-project.org). SHARE is closely linked to the US Health and Retirement Study (HRS) and the English Longitudinal Study of Ageing (ELSA) and has become a role model for several ageing surveys worldwide. SHARE's scientific power is based on its panel design that grasps the dynamic character of the ageing process. The design approach that delimits the scope of the study of individual and societal ageing, and its cross-nationally ex-ante harmonized design that permits international comparisons of health, economic and social outcomes in Europe and the USA.

### Data resource basics

Population ageing is one of the great societal challenges of the 21st century. Beginning in the 1990s, this trend mostly affected wealthy countries but is currently spreading to countries of low and medium fertility rates. According to Eurostat, the rate of older people (65 years and above) in Europe, in relation to persons in their working age, is expected to almost double by 2050. This demographic transition is unparalleled in human history and poses big challenges to the welfare state. In 2060, for every one working person there will be one retired person.

Although the demographic trends and their two main causes (low fertility and increasing life expectancy) are clear, not enough is known about consequences and implications of population ageing or its consequences through policy making, understanding how the ageing process will affect all of us, and disentangling the influences of different cultures, histories and policies, is an important task for almost all fields of social and economic sciences, epidemiology, gerontology, history and sociology in order to turn the challenges of population ageing into opportunities.

In response to the European Commission's strong interest in obtaining scientific evidence on population ageing in its member states, SHARE was created as a long-term international infrastructure for researchers from multiple disciplines.<sup>1</sup> Although its development started only in 2002, SHARE has already become one of the crucial pillars of the European Research Area (ERA). It has been the first ever European Research Infrastructure Consortium (ERIC), with a new legal status and many of the advantages of major international organizations. The project is funded by the EU up to 2024. The ultimate goal is to provide high-quality micro-level panel data of economic, social and health factors to accommodate and inform ageing processes at the individual and societal level in addition to its multidisciplinary and longitudinal nature. SHARE was set up to be a cross-national enterprise to study the effects of population ageing on European welfare state regimes moderate and mediate consequences and implications of population ageing. The data from people aged 50 years and over are collected in households. The data are provided free of charge to the scientific community.

Two more features make SHARE a highly valuable source for genuine cross-cultural comparisons. First, SHARE is closely modelled after and constantly harmonized with its sister studies HRS in the USA and ELSA in the UK. This has made SHARE an informed exciting new survey research on ageing all over the world, e.g. Japan (JSTAR), China (CHARLS), Brazil (ELSI), South Korea (KLOSS) and India (IASI). The data are collected in a similar, if not specific, Second, and as opposed to these global sister surveys, SHARE is in itself a multi-national survey. The SHARE interview is ex-ante harmonized and all aspects of the data collection process, from sampling to translation, from fieldwork to data processing, have been conducted according to strict quality standards. This has enabled the generalization in spite of national differences and decentralized funding that permits great scientific and governance challenges.

The structure of this article is as follows. We will first document eligibility rules and survey participation before we introduce the panel and life history questionnaires as well as methodological issues. Then, we will discuss the findings as well as the strengths and weaknesses of SHARE and lastly indicate where readers may find more information about the study.

### Data resource area and population coverage

After four waves of SHARE, more than 150 000 interviews have been conducted with about 86 000 respondents aged 50 years and over and their

(young) partners in 19 countries (Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Slovenia, and the United Kingdom; see Figure 1).

The SHARE target population consists of all persons born in 1954 or earlier in Wave 1 (2004/05), 1956 or earlier in Wave 2 (2006/07), 1958 or earlier in Wave 3 (2008/09) and 1960 or earlier in Wave 4 (2010/11) who have their regular domicile in the respective SHARE country. A person is excluded if she or he is incarcerated, hospitalized or of missing status during the entire survey period, unable to speak the country's native language or has moved to an unknown address. In addition, current partners living in the household are interviewed regardless of their age. SHARE respondents who were previously in any previous wave are part of the longitudinal sample. They are traced and re-interviewed if they moved within the country (for more information see the SHARE methodology volume<sup>2,3</sup>).

SHARE is a multinational survey, which involves differences in sampling procedures between countries. These differences are chosen to coincide with the best available frame resources in the country to achieve full probability sampling. Most SHARE countries have access to population registers. These registers are used to create weights that compensate for unequal selection probabilities of the various sample units. Without such weights it is not possible to obtain unbiased estimators of population parameters of interest.

- As changes sometimes have to be conducted due to societal changes (e.g. new communication tools) or due to flaws found in the previous waves (e.g. ambiguous understanding of question wording) you will find an overview of the generic versions of the questionnaires in wave 1, wave 2, wave 4, and wave 5 where you can track the deviations between waves easily. "Wave 3" was a different questionnaire named SHARELIFE and is not included.







The SHARE data are distributed through our Research Data Center which is physically located at CentERdata on the Tilburg University campus in the Netherlands. The SHARE Research Data Center complies with the Criteria of the German Council for Social and Economic Data for providing access to microdata.

**SHARE Data Access Rules**

The SHARE data can be **downloaded** from the SHARE Research Data Center under the following conditions:

1. Applicants must have a scientific affiliation and have to sign a statement confirming that under no circumstances the data will be used for other than purely scientific purposes.
2. Data will only be made available after these documents have been received, by mail or fax (care of Josette Janssen, address: CentERdata, Tilburg University, P.O. Box 90153, 5000 LE Tilburg, The Netherlands; e-mail: [janssen@uvt.nl](mailto:janssen@uvt.nl); fax: +31 13 4662764). The required forms can be **downloaded** [here](#). Upon request a copy by fax can be sent. Upon receipt of the signed statements users will receive a **username** and **password** enabling them to download the data. Registration is free of charge. Registered users are allowed to use data of the SHARE project as long as the scientific affiliation indicated in the user statement is valid. The original login code and password persist for all subsequent releases of the data. A new statement has to be filled, however, when any of the specifications given in the statement (incl. e-mail address) change. If users forgot their password, they should go to <http://link.centerdata.nl/sharedata>. A password can however only be resent if the e-mail address typed in is the same as used when applying for the data. Additionally, the data are available via the [GESIS Data Archive for the Social Sciences](#).
